ACB arrests postal employee in Bandipora for accepting bribe

Srinagar : The Anti-Corruption Bureau (ACB) on Monday arrested a postal employee in Bandipora after he was caught red-handed while accepting a bribe of ?6,500. An official said that an ACB team conducted a trap at the Post Office Bandipora, during which Mudasir Ahmad Najar, a resident of Rohama, Baramulla, presently posted as a Postal Assistant, was apprehended while accepting the bribe. "The accused was caught redhanded and taken into custody immediately on the spot," the official said, adding that necessary legal formalities were completed. The ACB is continuing its crackdown on corruption in public institutions, and further investigation into the matter is underway.

I-T dept conducts raids in bogus tax deductions case

New Delhi, July 14: The Income-Tax Department on Monday launched multicity raids as part of a tax evasion probe against those entities which assist certain individuals avail bogus deductions in their returns by claiming a variety of exemptions, official sources said.

They said false deducс м tions claimed by persons in Y B lieu of making political donations to registered or unregistered political parties, payment of medical insurance, tuition fee and certain category of loans are among those cases which are being investigated as part of these raids. Certain individuals and their tax advisors like filers and accountants, who help them claim bogus exemptions, are being searched as part of the operation, they said. Gupta, who earlier also served as secretary of the Vishva Hindu Parishad (VHP), spent about 13 months in jail during the Emergency as a Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS) worker.

TT Correspondent Srinagar, July 14 : Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo, today chaired a meeting to review imple-mentation of the Ayushman Bharat Digital Mission (ABDM) in Jammu and Kashmir with a focus on ensuring seamless integration of healthcare data and digital services across the UT. The meeting was attended by Secretary, & Health Medical Education; Managing Director, ABDM; Principals of Government Medical Colleges; Director Coordination (Medical Colleges) and other senior officers of the Department.

Taking stock of the ongoing initiatives under ABDM, the Chief Secretary underscored the urgency of patient health linking with ABHA records (Ayushman Bharat Health Account) IDs, emphasizing that no stone should be left unturned to complete this vital digital transition without any further delay. He called for interlinking of Sehat, ABDM and HMIS portals, to create a unified digital ecosystem that empowers the patients, healthcare professionals and institutions to access and share data effortlessly through a single platform. Dulloo stressed that contin-

Third body recovered in LJHP canal tragedy, one still missing

Srinagar : The body of the third victim in the LJHP canal tragedy was recovered on Monday afternoon, taking the death toll in the incident to three. Officials said the body of Haji Mehnaz Rashid Shah, a 40-year-old resident of Khanyar, Srinagar, was retrieved this afternoon following an intense multiagency search operation. Shah was among three family members swept away by strong river currents while attempting to rescue two children who had slipped into the water during a picnic. One person was rescued on the same day, while the bodies of two minors including Ahmad Bin Khalid of Hyderpora and another child from Narkara, Budgam were recovered earlier. The now-concluded rescue operation involved teams from SDRF Baramulla, Civil Defence Uri, J&K Police, and local volunteers, who worked tirelessly for over 36 hours to locate all the victims.

Aviation (DGCA), has directed all airlines operating Boeing

aircraft to complete thorough inspections of the locking mechanism in fuel control switches by July 21. The instruction follows heightened global attention on aircraft safety, especially concerning the Boeing 787 series. The Aviation Federal Administration (FAA), back in

2018, had flagged the potential disengagement of the fuel control switch locking feature on certain models of Boeing aircraft, including 787s and 737s. the It was mentioned in a Special Airworthiness Information Bulletin (SAIB) but there was no airworthiness directive, indicating that the issue was not a safety concern. The move comes in the wake of the initial probe report by the Aircraft Accident Investigation Bureau (AAIB) into the June crash involving an Air India aircraft. Since the findings emerged, major international and domestic carriers have begun inspecting fuel switch locking systems as a precautionary measure. In an official statement, the DGCA noted, "It has come to the notice of DGCA that sever-

On Monday, DGCA said it has come to its notice that several operators, internationally as well as domestic, have initiated inspection of their aircraft fleet as per the FAA's SAIB. tourism. "All airline operators of the

affected aircraft are hereby advised to complete the inspection...no later than 21st July 2025. Inspection plan and report after accomplishment of inspection shall be submitted to this office under intimation to concerned Regional Office," the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) said in an order. Fuel control switches regulate the flow of fuel into aircraft engines. Air India, Air India Express, Akasa Air and SpiceJet are among the domestic carriers operating Boeing 787 and 737 aircraft. In its preliminary report on the Boeing 787-8 crash released on Saturday, the Aircraft Accident Investigation Bureau (AAIB) said the fuel supply to both engines of the plane was cut off within a gap of one second, causing confusion in the cockpit soon after take-off.

conflict: EAM Need to address de-escalation, competition should not turn into Jaishankar

New Delhi/Beijing, July 14: India and China should build on "good progress" in normalising the bilateral ties to address border-related issues including de-escalation, and it is essential to avoid "restrictive trade measures and roadblocks", External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said on Monday during talks with his Chinese counterpart Wang Yi.

In his opening remarks at the meeting, Jaishankar said the bilateral relations can develop in a "positive trajectory" on the foundation that differences should not become disputes and nor should competition become conflict, adding the ties can be built only on the basis of mutual respect, mutual interest and mutual sensitivity.

The external affairs minister said India hopes "zero tolerance for terrorism" will be upheld at the upcoming meeting of the SCO, saying its primary mandate is to combat terrorism, separatism and extremism, comments seen as a reference to Pakistan's support to cross-border terrorism. Jaishankar met Wang hours after he landed in China on a two-day visit to attend a conclave of the Cooperation Shanghai

Organisation (SCO). It is his

It is a result of the resolution of friction along the border and our ability to maintain peace and tranquillity there. This is the fundamental basis for mutual strategic trust and for smooth development of bilateral relations. It is now incumbent on us to address other aspects related to the border, including de-escalation," the external affairs minister said. Jaishankar also repeated New Delhi's consis-

tent position that India-China ties should be based on "mutual respect, mutual interest and mutual sensitivity". As neighbouring nations and major economies in the world today, there are various facets and dimensions of our ties. Measures towards normalising our people-to-people exchanges can certainly foster mutually beneficial cooperation," he said. It is also essential in this context that restrictive trade measures and roadblocks are avoided. I hope to discuss these issues in further detail. The external affairs minister noted that "stable and constructive" ties between India and China are not only to each other's benefit, but that of the world as well. This is best done by handling rela-

tions on the basis of mutua respect, mutual interest and mutual sensitivity. We have also earlier agreed that differences should not become disputes, nor should competition ever become conflict. On this foundation, we can now continue to develop our ties along a positive trajectory.

Jaishankar said the bilateral relationship requires both sides taking a "far-seeing approach" even as he referred to a meeting between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Chinese President Xi Jinping in Kazan in October last year. Since our leaders' meeting, the India-China relationship has been gradually moving in a positive direction, he said, adding "our responsibility is to maintain that momentum. In
