Public Outrage in Khour and Sainth Over Attack on Journalists, Police Inaction Under Fire



KHOUR, AUG. 08: Strong protests erupted in Khour on Friday against the recent murderous attack on journalists Atul Sudan and Ashwani Bhardwaj, with angry youth taking out a protest rally through the main market. A day earlier, dozens of residents in Sainth village had also staged a demonstration, accusing the police of deliberate inaction and demanding that the accused be booked under the stringent Public Safety Act (PSA).

During the Khour protest, Shambhu Sharma raised serious questions over the police's functioning, stating that if the Station House Officer (SHO) is incapable of taking appropriate action in this case, he should be transferred immediately. Former Panch Mangesh alleged that earlier the area had witnessed cases of cattle smuggling and drug trafficking by a particular community, but in recent times there has been a spurt in

attacks on masons and incidents of loot. He said that had the police acted sternly on previous cases, the present situation could have been avoided.

Protestor Sumit Sharma termed the attack on journalists "shameful" and said it has created an atmosphere of fear in society.

He warned that if the police fail to teach the culprits a strong lesson, their morale will rise further, eroding the sense of security in the communi-

He also demanded that police take strict action against illegal structuresbuilt on government land-from the proceeds of drug and cattle smuggling, and demolish them using bull-dozers on the lines of Uttar Pradesh.

At the protest in Sainth village, locals had alleged that if timely and strong action had been taken against the accused in earlier crimes, the murderous assault on journalists would never have happened. They claimed that between Bawe Talab

dents of loot, cattle smuggling, and drug trafficking have taken place, yet the police have taken no concrete steps. They further alleged that even police checkpoints have been attacked several times, but the police have remained silent.

The protesters in Sainth also said that the FIR in the journalists' assault case has been registered under weak, bailable sections-omitting charges of attempt to murder, use of sharp-edged weapons, and damage to the journalists' vehicle amounting to

They further recalled that only days before this attack, a similar assault took place on a Forest Department officer's vehicle, and despite a written complaint to Kanachak Police Station, no action

Both in Khour and Sainth, protesters raised slogans including "We want justice", "Wake up Police Administration" and "Stop hooliganism". They warned that if strict action is not taken against the accused, the agitation will be intensi-

BGSBU crisis hurting students in border areas: Dr. Shazad TT CORRESPONDENT

JAMMU, AUG. 08: The Jammu and Kashmir Border Area Development Conference (JKBADC), a registered organisation working for the tribal population in the border areas of J&K, has expressed serious concern over the recent media reports about shortage of faculty and other staff at Baba Ghulam Shah Badshah University (BGSBU), Rajouri. The media reports, based on an RTI reply, reveal that nearly 60% of teaching posts at

the university are lying vacant.

According to the report, out of 235 sanctioned teaching positions, 142 are currently vacant. This includes all 22 posts of Professors, 48 out of 50 Associate Professors, and 72 out of 82 Assistant Professors. The media RTI reveals that the university is being run largely by a small group of junior teachers, who are already overburdened. Dr. Shazad Ahmed Malik, Chairman of JKBADC and former Vice Chancellor, said the ongoing crisis at BGSBU is extremely worrying for students from border

versity for higher education. The former VC stressed that BGSBU was established to uplift underdeveloped regions, and failing to support it defeats the purpose of its foundation. More than 80 non-teaching positions are also vacant, including Principals, Controller of Examination, Medical Officer, and other key technical and support roles. This lack of manpower is seriously affecting the day-to-day functioning of the university.
