# Floods expose administrative failures; Bhalla demands accountability, action

JAMMU, SEPT. 12: The
Working President of the Jammu and Pradesh Congress Committee (JKPCC) and former minister, Mr Raman Bhalla, on Friday strongly condemned the administration for its consistent fail-ure to take necessary flood protection measures over the last decade.

He held the authorities responsible for the large-scale loss of property and agricultural livelihoods in Jammu province, especially in areas severely affected by floods in the last

week of August. During his visit to flood-affected villages, including Dharap, Dharap Kothey, and Shergarh in Jammu district, Mr Bhalla interacted with distressed families and farmers whose lives and means of subsistence have been devastated by the recent floods. He expressed grave concern at the widespread destruction, reporting that hundreds of kanals of standing crops have been washed away or submerged, leaving cultivators in

Bhalla was accompanied by Sarpanch Kashmir Singh, Balkar Singh, Harbans Singh, Prem Kumar, Ranjit Singh, Surjeet Singh, Dadar Singh, Shanty, Sanjay Katal, and oth-

Addressing the gathered residents, Mr Bhalla said, "It is extremely painful to see our hardworking farmers losing their crops once again. The floods have not only damaged agricultural fields but also homes, roads, and basic infrastructure that are lifelines for rural communities. These losses are preventable, and the administration's failure to implement flood mitigation strategies reflects a lack of foresight and commitment."

He pointed out that the floods of 2014 had served as a stark warning, yet no long-term flood protection plans have been enforced.

"Instead of learning from past disasters, authorities have repeatedly ignored the need to strengthen riverbanks, upgrade drainage systems, and ensure timely intervention. As a result, vulnerable communities are left exposed to nature's fury," Mr Bhalla remarked and regretted that no step was taken to prevent flow of

water of Balol Nullah in these areas. The JKPCC leader further criticized the delay in relief and rehabilitation efforts, noting that affected families are still awaiting compensa-tion and support. "People here are

demanding their right to protection and timely assistance. The government must ensure that those who have lost their livelihood are not abandoned to suffer alone," he

During his visit, Mr Bhalla personally inspected damaged fields, spoke to farmers, and assured them that their plight will be raised at all platforms. He also urged district and state authorities to conduct thorough damage assessments and expedite relief packages, including financial assistance, restoration of irrigation

channels, and repair of access roads. Highlighting the broader implications, Mr Bhalla said, "Floods not only destroy crops but also erode the confidence of communities. If protective measures are not implement-ed in a structured manner, repeated disasters will push rural families into poverty, force migration, and further strain local economies."

He called for a comprehensive flood management policy that includes regular maintenance of rivers and drainage channels, construction of embankments, early warning systems, and communitylevel awareness programs.

"It is high time the administration

prioritizes disaster preparedness and

works hand-in-hand with experts, engineers, and local communities to build resilient infrastructure," he stated. Bhalla assured the people that he will continue advocating for the welfare of flood-hit families and pressing the government to act with urgency and responsibility. "The people of Jammu deserve dignity, security, and the means to rebuild their lives. Their voices cannot be ignored," he affirmed.

## Omar Abdullah's NC Govt Exposed: Full Funds to Srinagar, Jammu Still Deprived of CAPEX Share

Bharatiya Janta Party (BJP) has accused the NC-led elected government headed by Chief Minister Omar Abdullah of indulging in blatant regional discrimination by depriving Jammu of its rightful share of CAPEX funds.

Addressing a joint press conference here at Party Headquarters today, BJP Spokespersons Gaurav Gupta and Zorawar Singh Jamwal in presence of party Media Incharge Dr. Pardeep Mahotra, revealed that both Jammu Municipal Corporation (JMC) and Srinagar Municipal Corporation (SMC) were to receive around ?40-50 crore each under CAPEX. However, while SMC has been granted full release of funds and is ready to begin developmental works, JMC is still awaiting nearly ?26 crore-almost half of its allocation.

"This is a shocking example of step-motherly treatment. Despite Jammu facing devastation from cloudbursts, flash floods, and heavy rains which left roads, drains, water supply systems, and other civic infrastructure crippled, the Omar Abdullah government has not released even a single penny against JMC's ?60 crore pro-



being pushed to suffer while Srinagar marches ahead," Gaurav Gupta said.

He stressed that the Housing Development Urban Department (H&UDD), which is under the direct charge of Chief Minister Omar Abdullah, has failed in its duty towards Jammu. "By releasing full funds to Srinagar while deliberately stalling Jammu's share, the NC-led dispensation has once again exposed its anti-Jammu mindset. This biased governance is unacceptable and will be resisted at every level," he added.

Gupta further said that if the pending ?26 crore is released without delay, urgent works like retaining walls at vulnerable Nallahs, permanent road restoration, and strengthening of water supply systems can be immediately

"Temporary repairs may give short-term relief, but without permanent solutions, Jammu will remain vulnerable during every monsoon," he warned.

Calling for immediate corrective action, Zorawar Singh Jamwal asserted that the people of Jammu will no longer tolerate discrimination. "Our demand is crystal clear-equal treatment, timely release of funds, and accelerated develop-

The Omar Abdullah government must answer why it gave full funds to SMC but denied the same to JMC. This betrayal of Jammu will not be forgotten," he maintained.

Concluding the press conference, Gaurav Gupta demanded immediate release of the pending ?26 crore for JMC, stressing that Jammu deserves nothing less than equal treatment and justice.

## Arvind inspects Nallahs in Jammu West, directs authorities for immediate desilting

Gupta said. He emphasized that the welfare of people was his top priority.

"Our administration is committed to providing solutions. timely Departments have been instructed to work in a mission mode to ensure proper drainage facilities. Accountability will be fixed if there is any laxity," he added.

Gupta also directed officials to deploy additional manpower and machinery for clearing blockages and appealed to residents to cooperate by not dumping household waste into the

He assured that all necessary steps would be taken to strengthen drainage infrastructure in Jammu West.

"The recent rains were a wake-up call. We cannot complacency. Preventive measures are being put in place to protect people from such inconvenience in the future," Gupta maintained. Local residents

expressed satisfaction over the MLA's proactive approach and hoped for swift redressal of the drainage issues.
